
population 1.6 million people.



Like many older cities, economic resources here are severely depleted. Most people living in the so-called "inner core" of the city lack the most basic infrastructure – decent schools, adequate housing, safe streets.

Let's zoom in closer to a 10 square block area in North Central Philly, part of the neighborhood called **Germantown.**

This is an especially hardhit neighborhood in a city full of hard-hit neighborhoods...




During the 2000 census, 20% of the homes here (one out of every five) were vacant and half of all residents fell below the poverty line, with 41% of households earning less than \$10,000. Ten percent of the adults were unemployed, more than two times the national average.

This is not a new story at all.



Normally, people in neighborhoods like this have three choices:
(a) accept the circumstances; (b) fight against improvements biased towards bringing in wealthier people; or (c) leave as soon as possible.

None of these options is really viable.






Some people here had a different idea
